# Cook's Corner

#### Vidalia Onion Pie

(Recipe is from the Whiskey Creek Country Club cookbook.)

- 1 cup saltine crackers, crushed
- 21/2 cups Vidalia onions
- 2 eggs
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
- 5 tablespoons melted butter
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 3/4 cup milk

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine melted butter and crushed saltines to form crust in 8-inch pie plate. Bake for 8 minutes.

Sauté onions in oil until soft. Pour into pie shell. Mix other ingredients (except cheese) and pour over onions. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake for 45 minutes in 350 degree oven. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

#### **Answers:**

Sales of Whiskey Creek homes in 2020 (through June 30) are roughly the same in number: 24 in 2020 versus 23 in 2019 and price \$343K versus \$340K as the first six months of 2019.

#### No. 2. A

Author Jill Allen wrote a 2010 story in Gulf Shore Life saying that Whiskey Creek got its name from a Tennessee moonshiner. William S. Clay settled in Fort Myers after the Civil War. Using sugar cane, he set up a still on a "creek located several miles west of Monroe and Hendry streets." They say Bill Clay's liquor was enjoyed by both cattlemen and Seminole Indians alike. The area became known as Whiskey Creek.

Whiskey Creek Country Club is debt free and owned

by some of the members who hold equity certificates. Certificates are available now for new members. Talk to the manager, John Tuscano, if interested.

Last year there were 35 Whiskey Creek and Wyldewood Lakes duplex villas sold with an average price of \$179,000 and 1,644 square feet under air. Also, last year there were nine Whiskey Creek Condos (low-rise near College Pkwy.) sold with an average price of \$126,000 and 956 square feet under air.

#### No. 5. C

Last year there were 44 Whiskey Creek Single Family homes (not on water) sold with an average price of \$336,000 and 2,047 square feet of living area under A/C. Five more waterfront homes sold with an average price of \$554,000.

#### No. 6. C

The extra Sheriff's patrol which helps to protect Whiskey Creek citizens is paid for by a small (1 percent) real estate tax on Whiskey Creek homes which funds the MSTBU (Whiskey Creek Taxation and Benefits Unit). The MSTBU also covers the mowing and irrigation of the median along Whiskey Creek Drive and the entrance signs and lighting at the entrances to Whiskey Creek at McGregor and College.

Whiskey Creek Drive (McGregor to College) is about 1.75 miles in length. It's lined with trees, well maintained and great for walking or biking.

Our beautiful Lake Champagne is about a mile long (1,760 yards) per Google earth.

There are approximately 5,000 residents of Whiskey Creek living in 1,577 homes.

# **Sound Advice: Nutrition In Age-Related Hearing Loss Continued**

Last week's article cited two studies implicating folic acid and vitamin B12 deficiencies with age-related hearing loss. The first study, published in the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition* in 1999, found that elderly women with impaired hearing had a



significantly lower level of folate and B12 than women of the same age with normal hearing. A second study, published in the January 2, 2007, issue of the *Annals of Internal Medicine*, found that subjects who were given a folic acid supplement of 800 micrograms of folic acid per day for three years had a lower level of age-related hearing loss than subjects not supplemented with folic acid.

**How B12 And Folate Deficiencies May Cause Hearing Loss** 

The cochlea of the inner ear is where much of the hearing loss in the elderly is believed to occur. The

cochlea is dependent upon an adequate blood supply. It is highly vascularized and supported by a single artery. Homocysteine, a toxic amino acid, is elevated during deficiencies of vitamin B12, folate or both.

Homocysteine is believed to damage blood vessels, and high levels of homocysteine are a risk factor for cardiovascular disease and strokes. The authors of the study theorized that high homocysteine concentrations, resulting from deficiencies of vitamin B12, folate or both, might also adversely affect blood flow to the cochlea. Homocysteine is toxic to the nervous system, as well, and might damage nerves in the inner ear.

#### **Preventing And Correcting B12 And Folate Deficiencies**

The first line of defense is diet. Folate is found in green leafy vegetables, including spinach. It is found in tomatoes, eggs, whole grains, citrus fruits, liver, pears, beans, nuts, potatoes, beets, cabbage, asparagus, wheat germ and many other foods in lesser amounts.

Vitamin B12 is found only in foods of animal origin: beef, lamb, poultry, pork, fish, liver, eggs and dairy.

However, vitamins can be destroyed in processing and cooking. Therefore, it is important to eat foods that are fresh, whole and unprocessed and either raw or lightly cooked. Fresh fruit and salads are examples of foods that can be eaten raw. Vegetables should be lightly cooked. Meat, fish and poultry should not be overcooked.

The second line of defense is supplementation. The amount of folic acid in most vitamin supplements, 400 micrograms, works well enough to lower blood homocysteine levels in a week or two.

Most multivitamins contain about 10 micrograms of B12, which is adequate if vitamin B12 is being absorbed. If it is not, then B12 lozenges that dissolve under the tongue might allow adequate B12 to be absorbed through the mucous membranes in the mouth, thus passing the digestive tract. Since only 1 percent or 0.1 percent of vitamin B12 is absorbed in this way, the recommended dosage is 1,000 micrograms per day. It is important to consult a doctor if a B12 deficiency is suspected.

# **Catch The Action**

#### **August On The Water**

August in Southwest Florida means hot sticky days, plenty of rain, and often thunderstorms. If you do not mind working around the weather the fishing is often pretty good and competition is scarce.

Catching redfish should become more consistent as the month progresses. Odds are better on days with extreme high tides; this is the time to fish the baits deep under the shade of the mangroves.

Floating a silver dollar size live pinfish or pilchard under a cork or soaking dead bait including cut ladyfish, pinfish, and mullet are all excellent redfish baits. These redfish are tight under the mangroves on the higher stages of the tide, it is important to keep the bait as tight to the mangroves as possible. Cut bait often

makes a better choice than live under the bushes, as redfish are scent feeders and fresh cut bait oozes plenty of stinky aromas. By the end of the month schools of large reds should begin bunching up on the flats for their fall run.

There's opportunity to hook into some big catch and release summer trout along with lots of undersized fish. Look for the larger trout widespread over areas of open water where sand bars separate deeper water from three- to six-foot-deep grass bottom. Schools of baitfish are concentrated in these areas. Trout, along with Spanish mackerel, bluefish, ladyfish and small sharks are working the bait schools. This summer we are catching sand trout around these same areas. If you are not familiar, they look very similar to a spotted sea trout without the spots. The good news, they are very good eating plus have no size limit or season. They do have a one-hundred-pound bag limit, but I do not think we have to worry about exceeding that.

Season remains closed for snook, spotted sea trout, and redfish in waters of southwest Florida from the Hernando/Pasco county line south through Gordon Pass in Collier County. With the closure and catch and release only, stocks appear to be rebounding nicely. You can visit www.myfwc. com for all current regulations.

The mangrove snapper bite should continue strong throughout the inshore and near shore waters. Look for them

schooled up around structure with good water movement; this could include any of the Gulf passes, docks and jetties, bridges, piers and natural or man-made reefs. For bait, live shrimp, pilchards and small pinfish are the ticket, plus small pieces of cut bait. Snapper have great vision, a small circle hook with three to four feet of ten to twenty-pound fluorocarbon leader will put the odds in your favor. Snapper are not only hard fighting for their size, but also one of the absolute best tasting fish in our waters. If you have visitors over the summer, snapper can make a great target and reward you with a fine dinner.

Offshore, most anglers are looking for grouper and snapper, often making a long run of thirty miles or better for the larger fish. Closer to shore, within 10 miles of land, keeper size gags could be holding over limestone and rock ledges. Trolling deep diving lures or fishing live bait are favorite methods. Anchored over a near shore reef with a block of chum is a good bet to attract mangrove snapper plus a host of other fish. The best bet is to be on the water before sunrise and get back near shore early in the day ahead of afternoon storms.

Use the weather and tides to your advantage and fishing can be good during the hot month of August. Our inshore water temperature can change quickly, give us three or four days with bright sunny skies and the inshore waters quickly get hot and the bite can slow. A couple rainy days with limited sunshine and the water will drop several degrees; this can trigger very good fishing.

# Trees Reach Champion Size At Edison And Ford Winter Estates

Edison and Ford Winter Estates has five trees on the official Florida Champion Tree Register. The American Forests organization created the champion tree program in 1940 to recognize the largest known tree of each species in the United States. In 1975, Florida began keeping a state register and recognizes the largest trees within the state.

For a tree to qualify, a forester from the Florida Division of Forestry measures and scores it for program consideration. Scores are based on tree height, trunk circumference measured at about four and one-half feet from the ground and crown canopy. The champion isn't always the tallest tree. For example, the champion Buddha Coconut tree (*Pterygota alata*) in the Edison Ford research gardens is one of the tallest trees on the property, measuring 85 feet tall, but it is actually eight feet shorter than the other Buddha Coconut on the grounds.

The champion has a larger circumference (112 inches) and larger crown canopy, giving it a few more total points.

There are four other champions around the site: the King or Alexander Palm (*Archontophoenix alexandrae*) is located near the Moonlight Garden and stands at 66 feet tall and 40 inches in circumference; the Blue Mahoe (*Talipariti elatum*) is 59 feet tall and 133 inches in circumference and is growing near the pier; the Indian Coral Tree (*Erythrina variegata*) is 35 feet tall and 114 inches in circumference and is located near the Edison guest house; and the Puerto Rican Hat Palm (*Sabal causiarum*) is 45 feet tall and 89 inches in circumference, and stands near the Edison caretaker's house.

Other notable trees, include the Ditabark (*Alstonia scholaris*), located at the far end of the first parking lot off McGregor Boulevard. It is a Florida Challenger at 69 feet tall and 130

inches in circumference. It's a big tree, but there are two co-champions in Miami-Dade County that score higher. The iconic Banyan tree is considered by many to be the largest banyan in the continental United States and was once awarded Florida Champion Tree status. However, to protect historic buildings, the tree has been trimmed. The program currently lacks a standardized method to measure the circumference of trees like the banyan, which prevents it from officially being declared as a champion. Tree experts are trying to establish a standard

establish a standard method for measuring banyans for future comparisons and the Florida Champion Tree program does not currently include

There are many other majestic trees on the property, including ones that don't qualify for champion status. The Mysore Fig (*Ficus drupacea*) on the Ford property is grand with a height of about 86 feet and a circumference of 305 inches, but it does not even qualify for challenger status. The site has had six other champions over the years; however, some trees have died, and others have been surpassed by trees elsewhere in the state.

banyans on the list of measured species.

Beyond the champion trees, there are hundreds of other plants for visitors to see. The botanical gardens consist of 20 acres with more than 1,900 plants from 750 different species – not counting short-lived plants. There are also 300-plus species of ornamentals, 170-plus species of non-fruiting trees, 85 species of fruit trees, 14 species of citrus trees (not including the new plantings on the Ford property), 20 species of ficus, 97 species of palms, 17 species of bamboo, 20 species of cycads, 43 types of vines and 35 Staghorn ferns!

Throughout the site, there are several areas of defined specialty gardens, including the Moonlight Garden, filled with white flowers and a reflecting pool; Clara Ford's Rose Garden; the Succulent Garden, with an Agave plant that was an offspring from Thomas Edison's plant; a shade garden; a butterfly demonstration garden; and an area dedicated to Florida native plants.

For anyone who has never been to the site, there is a lot more to see beyond the gardens. The site includes the historic winter homes of Thomas Edison and Henry Ford, caretaker's homes of both inventors, Edison's study, a 15,000-square-foot Inventions Museum, and the Botanic Research Laboratory – a National Historic Chemical Landmark. Visitors can see hundreds of inventions and artifacts, as well as several antique cars.

The site is open from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., seven days a week. There are several tour options, including self-guided, historianled guided tours, inside-the-homes, automotive, and garden tours. Due to COVID-19, tour group size is currently limited to 10 people and masks are required for all guided tours. Masks are also required inside the museum and the botanic research laboratory. For everyone's safety, all staff are wearing masks, sanitizer stations are available throughout the site, and plastic shields have been installed at the ticket counter.

Visitors are encouraged to wear masks at all times and practice social distancing. Masks are available for sale in the museum store. For tour times, tickets or additional information, visit the website at www.edisonford.org or call (239) 334-7419.

#### **Edison And Ford Winter Estates**

Edison and Ford Winter Estates is the internationally known winter home site of Thomas Edison and Henry Ford. More than 250,000 visitors walk through the location each year from all around the globe. The organization has received many awards, including the National Stewardship Award from the National Trust for Historic Preservation and the National Garden Clubs' Historic Preservation Award. The property is an official project of "Save America's Treasures," a Florida Historic Landmark and a National Register Historic Site. The Edison Botanic Laboratory is a National Historic Chemical Landmark. The site is open every day except Thanksgiving and Christmas from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and until 9 p.m. during the month of December for Holiday Nights.
