Whiskey Creek Village Green Ditch Project

The common ditch that runs between all 14 sections of Whiskey Creek Village Green has been a problem to maintain. Since some sections maintain their part of the ditch and others do not, it causes a maintenance problem for all residents. Periodic maintenance of the ditch is necessary to maintain the flow of water and eliminate possible health hazards.

To simplify the maintenance issue, some of us have approached Lee County to get involved in maintaining the ditch for us, through the establishment of an MSTBU. This is like the current MSTBU, for maintaining the entryways, boulevard and street lighting in Whiskey Creek.

The county is willing to assist us with the project and has advised us concerning the process calculating the cost and feasibility of the project. This process consists of two steps. The first step is a petition signed by 50 percent-plus one owners, asking the county to perform a feasibility study. The cost of this study is \$500, which is being paid for by Section 6. Once the study is completed and the cost of the maintenance is determined, then a second petition will be circulated to the residents, with the same requirements of the

> first petition, for the MSTBU to move forward. If there are enough signatures at that point, the county assumes the maintenance of the ditch.



Safety At The Gas Station

Thefts at gas stations, across the United States, continue to occur. Video surveillance clips, from stations across the country, depict thefts from



unattended/unsupervised vehicles being fueled at the pump. An unlocked vehicle with personal items in sight ... especially when the driver is inside of the station or distracted ... makes for a quick and easy target.

Whether you are simply responding to texts while pumping gas or inside paying, thieves wait for the opportunity to quickly open your vehicle door and grab anything and everything of value. Purses are commonly left on the driver's seat and cell phones are often resting in/on

Choosing well-lit fuel stations with surveillance cameras decreases the appeal to criminals.

Whenever possible, purchase fuel during daytime hours and do so from a station that offers significant visibility to the roadway. Select a pump closest to the structure. This increases your visibility to cashiers and staff that work inside. Additionally, due to their proximity to the register, these pumps are generally free of skimming devices.

Locking your vehicle doors and keeping valuables out of sight make it extremely difficult for thieves to enter your car or truck. Take your keys with you ... do not leave them in the ignition or leave fobs on the seat.

Be certain to terminate your credit card transaction, at the pump, prior to leaving. This will ensure that no one else has access to your credit.

Avoid distractions. Be observant and aware of your surroundings. Take necessary precautions.

Catch The Action

August On The Water

Fishing or boating in Southwest Florida in August means dealing with the hot days of summer. Here are a couple of options to cool down and change things up a little.

If you just want to have fun and a little fishing while relaxing, then the beaches are a good choice, especially if you are fishing with the family. Good numbers of snook are roaming the surf throughout the summer and are a sight fishermen's dream. Most snook are running 22 to 26 inches, but there are much bigger ones. Free-lined pilchards, small pinfish, shrimp, white bucktail jigs, and a variety of small white flies are top baits. Look for the fish right off the edge of the beach in the surf or near any submerged structure. Remember snook are catch and release only. Trout, mangrove snapper, whiting, pompano and maybe a tarpon are a few of the other species you may hook into. Fish a little, swim a little, not a bad way to spend the day.

Summer days often give us flat calm seas over the morning hours, perfect for short runs offshore. Our coastline is dotted with artificial reefs, many well within sight of land and GPS coordinates available to the public. If you are an inshore angler, it's a nice change of pace to make a short run offshore, especially during the heat of summer when the inshore water temperatures are so high.

One cool aspect when fishing around the reefs is you never know what you might hook into. Everything from a small snapper to a 500-pound goliath grouper calls them home. To get the most out of the day you want an assortment of tackle that can handle the fish you target. Obviously with snapper you do not need super heavy tackle, the lighter the better for the best action. But, if you want to attempt to pull a big goliath grouper from his home you will need a rig extra heavy, we're talking 200- to 400-pound line. And many times, that's not heavy enough.



In between snapper and goliaths there's the possibility to hook Spanish and king mackerel, cobia, permit, barracuda, snook, sharks of all sizes, plus other species. Many anglers fish several different line class rods at a time targeting more than one species.

Armed with a variety of baits is the best way to catch multiple species. Small baits like shrimp, pilchards, and small pinfish are great for snapper and other bottom fish, larger live bait is often the ticket for a big barracuda, snook, or gag grouper; and big bait, dead or alive is the choice for goliaths. If you want to catch a permit you need live crabs, this is often the best bait for cobia as well. Anchoring up current of the structure with a quality block of chum is the best way to bring the action behind the boat.

It's a good idea to use the weather and tides to your advantage, especially over the hot month of August. Our water temperature can change quickly, give us three or four days with bright sunny skies and the inshore waters quickly get hot and the bite can slow. A couple rainy days with limited sunshine and the water will drop several degrees; this can trigger good fishing. If conditions allow get an early start to the day to allow for plenty of time on the water and back to a safe place ahead of afternoon storms.



The Lee County DOT has installed new reflective signs consisting of black arrows on a yellow background to highlight the curve to vehicles going south. Unfortunately, several of the vehicles that struck the wall were going north and crossed the median to hit the wall.

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The real estate market, like all markets, is cyclical. After a few years of booming sales and prices, a decline is to be expected. It is healthy. Whether the U.S. economy is in a recession is still unclear. But again, corrections are normal and healthy in the long term.

It is now August and a typically slow time for real estate sales. One of the many factors affecting home sales is hurricane season. If you are buying a home and want or need homeowner's insurance, hurricane season can affect your ability to purchase this type of insurance. Many insurance companies cannot issue a new homeowners insurance policy on a home when the home is the "in the cone of probability" of a hurricane. Since lenders will not fund a home loan without insurance, hurricane season can have a negative effect on home sales.

The mere threat of hurricanes can have some homebuyers rethink their desire for a vacation home in Florida. It is easier to sell a vacation home in Lee County when the weather is more paradise-like in winter. Even without hurricanes, our summer weather is often stormy and not as conducive to home shopping. However, some savvy shoppers wait until summer to buy just for that reason. They know that sellers can be more motivated in the summer when buyer activity is slower.

Flood and storm surge damage is not covered by homeowners' insurance policies. Whiskey Creek may offer buyers an advantage over some other areas in Southwest Florida. For one thing, most homes in Whiskey Creek are not located in a specially designated flood area that requires flood insurance by a mortgage lender. The fact that we are not in a high-risk flood area does not mean that we should not have flood insurance, but it does mean flood insurance is less expensive. Most flood insurance is underwritten by the federal government but there are some private flood insurance companies as well. The home's value and location determine the cost. Storm surge insurance is more expensive for homes closer to coastal waters.

Experts say that location, location, and location are the three most important criteria for making a home purchase. Whiskey Creek continues to check those boxes well. If you are a Whiskey Creek resident, you have made an excellent choice. Enjoy the summer.

Ibis

The Ibis is a community bird that stays together to probe shallow water, mud or grass with their long curved beaks. They live, travel and breed in flocks. In flight they form diagonal lines for a "V" formation. This configuration decreases wind resistance for the trailing birds. As the "leader" tires, it falls to the rear of the formation and an alternate takes the lead. This is an effective way to cover a great distance. You won't hear much from this breed, only an occasional grunt to warn the colony or a croaking on the breeding grounds. As an indicator of how ancient this species is, there are fossil records going back 60 million years!

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Alcohol And High Blood Pressure

When people develop hypertension, they may cut back on salt, try to lose weight, stop smoking, start exercising, reduce stress, lower intake of cholesterol and fat, and, if they are really knowledgeable, restrict their intake of sugar. If none of this works, they



then decide the problem must be hereditary and resort to drugs. But while making all these lifestyle changes, it never occurs to them to eliminate or cut back on alcohol because it never occurs to them that alcohol could be the culprit.

The Controversy

The relationship between alcohol and hypertension was first recognized in 1915 when a French physician named Lian reported alcoholism as a cause of hypertension in French servicemen. More than 50 years would go by before there was sufficient scientific evidence to confirm Lian's observation. There is now no question that consumption of three or more drinks of alcohol per day is associated with a significant increase in blood pressure. There is controversy, however, about the effects on blood pressure of one or two drinks per day. Some studies show an increase in blood pressure; some show no increase; and some actually show a decrease. The controversy centers around the studies that show a decrease.

One criticism of these studies involves differences between nondrinkers and moderate drinkers other than their intake of alcohol. Many nondrinkers are ex-drinkers. In a British study of middle-aged men done in 1990, 70 percent of the nondrinkers were ex-drinkers. Often ex-drinkers have stopped drinking because of health problems, and indeed exdrinkers have high rates of illnesses including heart disease, peptic ulcers, diabetes, bronchitis and gall stones. They are

older than drinkers, and a high percentage are smokers. In contrast, moderate drinkers in almost all these studies include the large group of light drinkers who are likely to have characteristics which are advantageous to health. They have the lowest prevalence of smoking, the lowest body mass index (a measure of obesity) and the highest level of physical activity of all the groups in these studies. So it is possible that the lower blood pressure of moderate drinkers compared to nondrinkers might be due to the differing health and lifestyle characteristics of the two groups rather than their differing consumption of alcohol.

The Problem With Epidemiology Studies

This is the problem with epidemiology studies (studies which show a relationship between lifestyle factors and diseases in populations): there are so many different factors involved that it is impossible to determine which of these factors is a cause in the prevention or promotion of a disease. For example, epidemiology studies on hormone replacement therapy (HRT) consistently showed that women who took HRT were less likely to get heart disease than women who did not take HRT. On the basis of these studies, doctors believed for half a century that long-term use of this therapy would protect women from heart disease. When the theory was put to the test in July of 2002 in a large, randomized, placebocontrolled trial that is the gold standard of science, women who were on HRT had a higher rate of heart disease than women who were not. In the earlier epidemiology studies, the women on HRT had healthier lifestyle characteristics than the women who were not on HRT. Their healthier lifestyles protected them from heart disease, not the hormone replacement therapy. The same might be true of the studies on alcohol, which are almost entirely epidemiological. Healthier lifestyles might be protecting the moderate drinkers from high blood pressure, not the alcohol.

heard it's good for you." When I told her that alcohol can raise

blood pressure, she was quite surprised. She had never heard

that before. She decided to cut her alcohol consumption to

half a glass of wine every other night with her dinner. When

I called her a couple of months later, her blood pressure had

Fortunately, the effect of alcohol on blood pressure can

be reversed, as was the case with my friend. If you have high

blood pressure and drink, try cutting back or eliminating

alcohol for two or three weeks. This is a way to find out

for yourself if your high blood pressure is alcohol-related.

Decrease in alcohol consumption is especially important

in view of evidence that alcohol-related hypertension may

contribute to the higher prevalence of strokes in drinkers.






Cesar is also the creator of Paionia in 2011, a wearable art brand focused on using discarded materials, mostly computer parts and discarded technology in an effort to create a sustainable consciousness in what we wear. Lee County Nabs Florida's Top Recycling Spot

Community Participation Pushes The County's Recycling Rate From 76 Percent To 81 Percent

Lee County Solid Waste has been named Florida's top recycling county by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). The amount of material Lee County residents recycled in 2021 would be enough to fill 168 football fields with material 70 feet high – as high as the highest point on the Sanibel Causeway.

Lee County received credit for recycling 1.6 million tons of the total 2.61 million tons of waste generated locally in 2021, according to numbers that FDEP recently released. This brings the county's recycling rate to 81 percent.

This is the sixth time Lee County has led the state in recycling since Florida began tracking in 2000.

Strong participation by both residents and businesses has enabled Lee County to meet and exceed the state's 75 percent recycling goal every year since 2017.

"Lee County residents are passionate about the environment and recognize that responsible recycling is part of the bigger picture," Solid Waste Director Doug Whitehead said.



"Our residents also are conscientious about 'clean recycling." That means the items are empty, clean and dry and placed loose in the recycling cart rather than in plastic bags."

FDEP recycling credits are acquired for items such as curbside recycling by residents as well as business recycling of materials such as cardboard, yard waste, scrap metal and construction and demolition debris. Lee County also receives recycling credit for energy produced from garbage processed at the Waste-to-Energy plant in Buckingham.
