President's Message

Deed Restriction Update

The Whiskey Creek Civic Association is working to revitalize deed restrictions enacted as the community was being developed. These restrictions, which by law cannot be more restrictive than the originals, must be approved by a majority of homeowners.



The Civic Association believes that the majority of Whiskey Creek homeowners favor deed restrictions to preserve the community's character and protect property values. Homeowner meetings held in 2015, comments on social media and conversations with neighbors indicate strong support for revitalizing deed restrictions. However, all homeowners have a say in this process. Your help is vital.

History

The development of Whiskey Creek began in 1970 as a deedrestricted community with restrictions to promote and preserve

the symmetry, beauty and general good of all interested in the scheme of the community.

The Marketable Record Title Act (MRTA), enacted in 1963, was found to have the unintended consequence of sun setting deed restrictions in Florida after 30 years. MRTA has rendered deed restrictions unenforceable. Efforts to have expired or expiring deed restrictions adopted by the Lee County Land Development code in 2015 were not successful. A new law, which goes into effect October 2018, provides the authority and process for revitalizing our deed restrictions.

Whiskey Creek consists of 15 separate units (sections) of single-family homes. Only single-family homes are governed by the Whiskey Creek Civic Association deed restrictions. (All condos and townhomes, including those near College Parkway, Wyldewood Lakes and the Village Green duplexes, are governed independently under their own bylaws and deed restrictions.)

The Civic Association is taking steps to revitalize the deed restrictions including:

1. Recruiting three volunteers from each of the community's 15 units to review existing restrictions and recommend changes or deletions. New restrictions cannot be added.

- 2. Soliciting input from homeowners.
- 3. Providing copies of proposed changes to homeowners.
- 4. Securing approval from the majority of homeowners in each unit.
- 5. Working with attorney Yeline Goin to take the legal steps needed to enact the revised restrictions.

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Catch The Action

Summer Fun

The thought of summertime takes me back to my school days, eagerly awaiting that last school bell of the year, the signal that classroom learning was finally over, and the start of summer was here. Many of my fondest memories are times spent fishing, boating and just being on the water with my family and friends. I was fortunate to grow up right here in Southwest Florida on Pine Island, where most things to do back then revolved around water activities.

Of course, when we mention Southwest Florida and water, the first thing that comes to mind is fishing. And for good reason, we have plenty of it to offer. If it's a family fishing trip make it simple and enjoyable, often we try to make fishing too complicated and difficult, thus turning it into a forgettable experience. I believe the ladies have figured this out. I can almost guarantee every time I have a lady angler on my boat she will catch the most and largest fish. I have come to the conclusion that this happens because she just relaxes and takes what comes, not taking fishing too seriously as is all too common with the male angler.

With kids, they really do not care what kind of fish they are catching; they just want to catch fish and lots of them. It's always better to go for quantity over quality. Use light tackle so even the small fish give a good fight and educate the young ones on the types of fish and how to properly handle them, so they can be released to grow bigger. The younger kids on my boat often spend more time playing with the bait in the live well than fishing.

I find that when fishing with children, the younger they are the quicker they lose interest, even if they are catching fish. Break up the day and make it an adventure, put the family on alert to watch for dolphins, manatees, eagles, ospreys, and other things that might interest them. As we are getting into the hot season you might be better to fish a few hours then take a lunch break, hit the beach or do both. You can either pack a picnic lunch and go to one of our pristine beaches or stop by one of the many restaurants that are boat accessible.

A few important tips before you go, take plenty of



sunscreen, snacks, and refreshments, preferably water. Sunglasses, hats, and protective clothing are a must to shield off the sun's damaging rays. Make sure everybody drinks water often; it's easy to get dehydrated in the sun without realizing it. It's important to keep the kids hydrated; they don't have as much body weight, so they can become dehydrated very quickly. We are getting into the time of year for afternoon thunderstorms, keep a watch on the horizon and do not get caught in open water in a storm. This is not only dangerous, it could ruin what would have been a great day. Make sure you are up on current fishing and boating rules and regulations, you can go to www.myfwc.com for information. And teach your family about conservation, how to respect and take care of our natural resources, so it will be here for their children.

We're lucky; we live in an outdoor paradise; it's a great place to spend the summer with family adventures

of water-related activities. There's often no need to travel on long expensive vacations for family entertainment when Southwest Florida has so much to offer, right in our own backyard.



Cook's Corner

We are so fortunate to live where shrimp is so very fresh. Here's one recipe using that pink gold that we found to be quite tasty. When I posted a photo on our family site, my granddaughter commented that she wasn't particularly



½ cup butter 3 garlic cloves

4 or 5 mushrooms, sliced

11/4 pounds shrimp, peeled and deveined

½ bag spinach

Angel hair pasta to feed four (cooked and drained)

1/4 cup dry white wine

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

Melt the butter in a non-stick pan over medium heat. Add the garlic and mushrooms; stir and sauté for two minutes. Add in shrimp and sauté until shrimp are pink. Add spinach and cook until wilted. Remove all to a warm oven.

Add a little more butter to the pan (you can take about a tablespoon from the 1/4 pound) When that has melted, add the wine and lemon juice. Bring to a boil and boil for about

Add the pasta to the pan and the shrimp mixture. Stir to combine and serve immediately. Have some Parmesan cheese on the side as well as some lemon wedges.





Not long ago a neighbor, with his dog, and I were walking in the same direction on one of our Whiskey Creek streets. His dog was doing some dog business and I caught up to them. I asked, "Where did you learn we should walk on the left side of the street facing oncoming traffic," (as we were doing)? Neither of us could remember for sure where, but we concluded it must have been when we were in Boy Scouts.

Not having sidewalks in our subdivision those of us who walk or run are forced to do so in the streets, and passing vehicular traffic comes close to us, sometimes very uncomfortably close. Why should we walk facing oncoming traffic? One reason is, that's the law in Florida (Section 316.130(4)! Perhaps they should, but sheriff's deputies are not likely to give citations to "persons afoot" for walking or running on the wrong side, so there needs to be a better reason, and there is! Potentially saving your life!

If you walk on the right side of the street, with the flow of traffic, you only have your ears to know of an approaching vehicle. On the left, though, you have your eyes as well, and I'll take any advantage I can, especially knowing when I should jump into a yard if necessary. Unfortunately, drivers can be, and sometimes are, distracted or even blinded when facing the sun.

For another reason, dog owners would likely appreciate the consistency of walking on the left, so as to avoid "headon" confrontations between their animals.

Many walkers and runners seem oblivious to the law and to common sense. If you're with others, make sure they walk or run on the left. Perhaps you could even point out politely and tactfully to those on the "wrong" side the reason for the law.

This doesn't even get to protections one should take after dark with reflective clothing and/or lights.

Are You Prepared For Hurricane Season?

It is time once again to start preparing for hurricane season as the prognosticators are saying this season will be an active one. It seems like only yesterday we were in the throes of *Hurricane Irma* and I know some people are still dealing with the aftermath. Right now, 14 named storms, seven hurricanes and three major hurricanes are predicted for this hurricane season that runs from June 1 through Nov. 30.

Take some time to:

- **1.** Create a written plan Take a few minutes and create a written plan what supplies do you need, emergency contact information, contractors you may need to call, evacuation and shelter in place plans, etc. What flood zone are you in? What happened in your area during *Hurricane Irma*? This will make it easier to see what you need to put your plan into action.
- **2. Develop an evacuation plan** Where will you go if you must evacuate? Do you or a member of your family have special needs? Will you need to go to one of the special needs shelters? If so, you must register in advance. Go to www.leegov.com/hurricane and click on the Advanced Planning link. Do you have pets? If so, they too need a plan.
- 3. Assemble your disaster supplies Plan on at least a one-week emergency supply of food, water and medication for you, each family member and your pets. You may be without electricity for longer so you

may want to either increase this amount or have a backup plan. In addition, you will want extra cash ... ATM machines do not work if there's no electricity. For a list of suggested supplies go to **www.leegov.com/hurricane**.

- **4. Get an insurance checkup** Act now as flood insurance requires a three-day waiting period.
- **5. Strengthen your home** If you plan on riding out a hurricane in your home make sure it is in good repair and up to hurricane building code. Gather the items you need now to properly board up your doors and windows. Don't forget about properly securing your garage door. This is the perfect time to make sure you have everything you need and to conduct a practice run. Did you lose any supplies since last season? Do you need to replace anything? Can you secure your garage door yourself or will you need assistance?
- **6. Talk to your neighbors** Are you and your neighbors willing and able to work as a team to secure each other's properties and trim trees if a hurricane is coming our way? Who needs extra help? What are you planning to do? If you decide to stay, who else is staying behind? You may be each other's bystander responder if roads are flooded. If you're evacuating, it is nice to have neighbors to call to get a report on how things look before you return. Begin preparing today for the 2018 hurricane season.



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
